We will continue our study of "Goliath Must Fall" by Louie Giglio on January 26th...

HAPPY NEW YEAR

We welcome 2020 and the challenges and opportunities it will surely bring in mission and service work. Before we let the old year go completely, however, we need to recognize Anne Tauber, Mountain Voices, our Chapel Choir and all the soloists and ensembles Anne assembled for our annual fundraising concert for Care Net. The program and our cookie reception afterwards were hugely successful, raising \$6,000 to feed the hungry in Macon County. Thanks to everyone who performed, baked, set-up/cleaned up, attended, and donated SO generously. In other year-end news, our Giving Tree of gifts for recipients from Macon Program for Progress and Union School was also a great success. Thanks to all who responded so generously, including Presbyterian Women who purchased coats for some Union School students. Finally, we made special year-end gifts to CareNet for specific use in utilities assistance and to the Senior Center's Home Delivered Meals (formerly Meals on Wheels).

Our "dollars" recipient for January and February will be Macon New Beginnings. This ministry, the only provider focused on shelter for the homeless and nearly homeless in the county, was a recipient of "dollars" a couple of years ago. We'll support them again now as we enter the winter season when needs are greatest. A representative will update us on their work in a Minute for Mission.

The first big event coming up in 2020 is on February 2, the annual Souper Bowl of Caring. We'll gather after worship for a simple meal of homemade soup and bread (as usual we'll ask the congregation to bring some desserts). We share this meal to remember those who don't have enough to eat on a day when many of us are gorging on football-watching food. Our soup selection will feature old favorites like Taco Soup, but we encourage first-time participation by soup chefs who want to share a favorite recipe. Just contact Nancy Browder or any member of the Mission & Service team. Donations will go to Care Net to feed the hungry locally. There will be a 50-cents-on-the-dollar match for all donations.

We're postponing our discussion of how to meet unanticipated urgent needs so we can gather more information about how other churches and nonprofits are responding to this issue. As we plan allocation of our 2020 budget, we'd be pleased to have congregational input about mission and service priorities. We're thankful for the way this congregation's heart for service shaped our work in 2019. We begin 2020 eager to see where the Lord leads us, confident that this church family's caring and compassionate spirit will be up to new challenges.




We Welcome Three New Elders To Our Session
